



THE HISTORY OF ARBOR DAY

The idea for Arbor Day originally came from Nebraska. It was the lack of trees in the state that led to the founding of Arbor Day in the 1800's.

J. Sterling Morton was a pioneer who moved to Nebraska in 1854. He was a journalist and became editor of Nebraska's first newspaper. A lover of nature, he knew that trees were needed windbreaks to keep soil in place, for shade from the hot sun, for fuel, and for building materials.



In 1872, J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees, and this holiday, called Arbor Day, was first observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska. Arbor Day was named a legal holiday in Nebraska on April 22, 1874, which also happened to be Morton's birthday. During the 1870's other states passed legislation to observe Arbor Day, and the tradition began in schools nationwide in 1882.

Today, Arbor Day celebrations are held in communities all over America, with the dates determined by the best tree planting times in each area. Celebrations are held as early as January and February in some southern states, and as late as May in more northern locations. National Arbor Day is celebrated each year on the last Friday in April. In California, Arbor Day is celebrated March 7-14, and the state tree is the California Redwood.

WHYARE TREES IMPORTANT

Trees are very important to our community and to our lives. Trees add value to your home, help cool your home and neighborhood, break the cold winds to lower your heating costs, provide food for wildliffs, and add beauty to the surroundings.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the net cooling effect of a young, healthy tree is equivalent to ten room-size air conditioners operating 20 hours a day. Also, one acre of forest absorbs six tons of carbon dioxide and puts out four tons of oxygen. This is enough to meet the annual needs of 18 people.

The National Wildlife Federation's statistics show there are about 60-200 million spaces along our city streets where trees could be planted. This translates to the potential to absorb 33 million more tons of CO2 every year, and saving \$4 billion in energy costs.

The planting of trees means improved water quality, resulting in less runoff and erosion. This allows more recharging of the ground water supply. Wooded areas help prevent the transport of sediment and chemicals into streams.

HOW TO CARE FOR YOUR TREE

Your sapling is a living thing and proper care must be given in order for it to reach maturity. Your tree is an Acacia baileyana purpurea. It is a small tree with fern-like leaves tinted purple. The tree grows naturally in Australia. The Royal Horticultural Society has given it their prestigious Award of Garden Merit.
