- 2. How many Rotarians participated in the project? Nine Rotarians participated in the grant
- 3. What did they do?Please give at least two examples (there were more than shown below, this was truly an "all hands on deck" project!)
- 1. Dr. Bartrom researched current developments in chemistry both currently taught and developing content, wrote the curriculum, drew the initial graphical components, formulated the questions, and syllabus, and wrote a text specifically adapted to the needs of the workshops. She then formed a team of herself, typist (Colin), translator (Brenda Ochoa, Chair of Foreign Language Dept. at VPHS) and graphic artist (Juan Pablo Larios, Graphic Design Instructor at VPHS) who then spent six months collaborating in developing, writing, illustrating, translating and refining the basic texts.
- 2. Mike Brunhoeber VPRC Rotarian and International Arm of Service, greeted parents as they brought their children to the workshop. Since he is fluent in Spanish it was clearly communicated that we invited them to stay and many did.
- 3. Ed Howard, VPRC Rotarian, and Principal of Villa Park High supported the project by providing recruiting support for the 1st year project (we hope to make this an annual event) through correlating outreach to faculty and Cerro Villa Middle School and also providing weekend access to classroom space. Ed also facilitated the project by supporting the endless hours of collaboration needed for translation of the science content in to Spanish and produce the twenty-two graphics required.
- 4. Marianne Koepnick Rotarian and VPRC Chair of Community Service provided hands-on support during the workshops for food handling, materials distribution at the beginning of the workshop and during the workshop as needs changed as the content changed.
- 5. Greg Mills- implementation support on the days of workshops as Coordinator of all materials and personnel
- 6. Ken Caplin- early involvement in August and September 2015 in Grant writing and development of budget
- 4. How many non-Rotarians benefited from this project? Sixty-seven ELD students and seventeen disadvantaged youth were the specific targets of this first year workshop series on sequential Saturdays in March. Collateral benefits went to the eleven parents who attended, and four college level Hispanic students who came to the 2nd workshop. Unanticipated benefactors beyond the workshops occurred as well; we have received wonderful feedback from families, who now have the books in their homes and are sharing them with all members of their families (with the "DEVELOPED THANKS TO A GRANT FROM ROTARY" [see photos] dedication at the front of the books both in English and Spanish!). Letters of appreciation have come from students, parents and administration (samples attached). The community has been receptive to the point inquiries have been concerning having one next year which is gratifying. This family involvement has been an unexpected "multiplied effect" of putting these materials into the hands of these families, and more ELD students have shown interest in signing up Chemistry this year. This clearly will have a growing effect on our school community as we hope to continue this project each spring when students are preparing for course selection. Estimated total who have directly or indirectly benefited at this time is approximately 200+ students, their parents and families, making this outreach enormously successful and well worth the months of preparation. The workshop and Rotarian support has appeared in the local newspaper, Villa Park Magazine, and OUSD school bulletins.

- 5. What are the expected long-term community impacts of the project? The long-term effects are the actual goal of this program which is why we hope to implement this workshop annually. The aim is to affect the <u>futures</u> of ELD and disadvantaged youth through the coursework decisions they make <u>today</u>. Therefore this workshop is viewed as (hopefully) the first in a series of annual workshops held in the spring (next year we look forward to "In Quest of the Quark II"), and <u>not</u> as an isolated event. The quest is for more than the quark; the quest is really for the future, and for the affirmation and strengthening of the young minds who will occupy it. As stated earlier: <u>the advancement of world understanding begins with self-respect and access to lift oneself out of poverty</u>. Education is the pathway which can accomplish both.
- 6. If a cooperating organization was involved, what was its role? Cooperating organizations included Villa Park High School which provided the classroom space, VPHS ChemClub which donated Sargent-Welch Periodic Tables, and VPHS Interact Club sorted, collated and stuffed the backpacks with all texts and materials prior to the workshop.
