Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?

The funds from this grant will be used to procure much needed medical equipment, training, and supplies for the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, Ukraine, to replace outdated and failing equipment which may not otherwise be repaired or replaced. The equipment is need to provide precise administration of aggressive chemotherapy drugs to children suffering from cancer and cancer related diseases. This grant will also provide for the training of medical personal at the Center in the proper operation and maintenance of the medical equipment purchased, and the purchase of supplies required to allow for operation and maintenance of the medical equipment for at least five years. As such, this grant will provide for the proper treatment for approximately 1,250 children suffering from cancer and cancer related diseases over the next five years.

On behalf of the Rotary Club of Cherkasy, Dr. Paliychuk will work closely with Dr. Oksana Gluhareva, Head of the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology and Chief Hematologist of Childhood in the Cherkasy Region, in overseeing the installation of the medical equipment purchased through this grant, as well as participate in the training of personnel in the proper operation and maintenance of the equipment, along with other members of the Rotary Club of Cherkasy.

Because of Dr. Paliychuk's familiarity with the Center and the challenges it faces, her Rotary Club, the Rotary Club of Cherkasy is the host Club and regularly participates in volunteer and sponsorship projects designed for children suffering from malignant tumors and blood cancer at the Center. Members of the host Club will continue to volunteer support to the Center as needed in implementing this project and visiting with the children who are there receiving treatment.

Host Club members will also work with Rotarians from other Clubs and Districts, including International Rotarians, to develop educational brochures for distribution in the local language regarding the warning signs of childhood cancer, the benefits of early detection, and the treatment options available for the treatment of childhood cancer and cancer related diseases at the Regional Children's Oncology and Hematology Center as a result of the efforts of Rotarians both locally and around the world.

Project planning

Describe the community needs that your project will address.

The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, Ukraine was opened in May 1993 in response to the rapid increase in the number of children being diagnosed with oncologic and related blood diseases in the wake of the Chernobyl disaster. The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy currently has 25 infusion pumps which are 13 years old, and are no longer reliable enough to assure accurate administration of the aggressive chemotherapy drugs often required to effectively treat the children at the Center. The Center also has two syringe pumps which were manufactured in 2004, and 22 infusion volumetric pumps, most if which were manufactured in 2005. The syringe and infusion volumetric pumps are also no longer reliable enough to assure accurate administration of the aggressive chemotherapy drugs to the children requiring them.

The Center has 30 regular patient beds, and an additional 4 single-bed wards for children requiring more aggressive chemotherapy. The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology is the only facility providing treatment to children suffering from cancer and cancer related diseases in the Cherkasy Oblast.

This grant is necessary to provide more efficient and effective medical treatment to children suffering from cancer and cancer related diseases in and around Cherkasy, Ukraine. Prior to the Chernobyl nuclear disaster in 1986, the instances of childhood cancer in the Ukraine were few and far between. Currently, over 600 children under the age of 18 with tumors and/or suspected blood disease are examined each year in the Cherkasy region alone. The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy treats nearly 250 children with cancer and/or cancer related diseases each year, with 35 to 40 new children being diagnosed with cancer each year. Lack of proper medical equipment prevents the ability of physicians at the Center to provide high-dose aggressive chemotherapy drugs required by some treatment protocols, which prevents giving a chance for recovery to a large number of extremely sick children each year.

The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy also provides palliative care to about 8 to 10 children each year, as there is no other facility in the Cherkasy region for palliative care for oncological and hematological patients who require permanent analgesia. This grant is also necessary to acquire the medical equipment required to properly administer patient-controlled analgesia.

How did your project team identify these needs?

More than 600 children having tumors, suspected cancer and/or blood diseases are examined yearly in the Cherkasy Oblast in the Ukraine each year. Of these, about 240 children were diagnosed with cancer in 2016 alone. About 40 new children with cancer are registered for treatment at the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy each year. The medical equipment to be procured through this grant is necessary so that these children receive proper medical treatment including administration of numerous cycles of high-dose poly-chemotherapy via accurate chemotherapy infusion syringe pumps and volumetric infusion pumps, without overdosing them, which can result in severe and painful side effects and death.

The need was identified by several of the oncologists and physicians who treat children at the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, including Dr. Oksana Gluhareva, Head of the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology and Chief Hematologist of Childhood in the Cherkasy Region; Dr. Olha Paliychuk, Oncologist and long time consultant to the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy; Dr. Anna Samokhval, Pediatric Oncologist; Dr. Mykhailo Petrenko, Pediatric

Anesthesiologist; Dr. Alina Teliuk, Pediatric Oncologist; and, Dr. Halych Volodymyr, Pediatric Hematologist.

How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?

The only members of the "benefiting community" are the minor children diagnosed with cancer and cancer related diseases in the Cherkasy Oblast, and while they will clearly benefit by having this life saving medical equipment available to the treating oncologists and physicians at the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, these minor children do not possess the skills necessary to determine the solution to their serious medical problems.

How were community members involved in planning the project?

Given the current conditions in the Ukraine, the extremely limited financial support available from the Ukraine government falls well short of the cost of this much needed medical equipment. This grant is needed immediately as the present equipment is outdated and unreliable, and prevents the treating physicians from administering the aggressive chemotherapy needed by many of the children at the facility at the precise dosages required.

Dr. Olha Paliychuk, Oncologist and long time consultant to the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, is a member and current President of the Rotary Club of Cherkasy, the Host Rotary Club, and she brought the need for this project to the members of her Club, as well as to International Club members during and since the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta in 2017.

Explain the process you used to select vendors.

It is well know in the medical field that Braun is a manufacturer of high quality and precision medical equipment, including the types of equipment required to implement this project and to be purchased with funds from this grant. There are equipment manufacturers in the Ukraine, such as Med Technika, however, it is known that the equipment manufactured in the Ukraine is of substantially less quality and is unreliable.

The Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy currently owns and operates other equipment manufactured by Braun, and Braun is the only manufacturer of certain equipment needed for this project which has representatives located in the Ukraine. Specifically, Braun is the Only manufacturer to

provide Space stations which allow up to four infusion pumps to simultaneously deliver chemotherapy drugs to a patient through a single catheter, so the child is not subjected to multiple injection sites or extended back to back dosage regimens. Braun is also the Only manufacturer of the Space PGA kits, i.e., Patient Controlled Analgesia, which permits on-demand intravenous administration of narcotic analgesics which are prescribed for terminally ill children who require palliative therapy and pain management in the later stages of the disease. The Braun Space PGA kits will allow a child or parent to administer narcotic analgesics immediately as needed, thereby eliminating the need for subject the child to delay in obtaining relief via painful intramuscular injections every few hours.

Furthermore, the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy currently has a service contract in place with Braun, through Providian Medical, to service other Braun equipment at the facility, so it is believed best to continue with the existing service contract. The equipment purchased from Braun with the funds from this grant includes three years of warranty service, as well as three years of on-site training at no additional cost, as stated on the Commercial Offer from Providian Medical accompanying this application. In addition, Providian Medical has agreed to donate two additional Braun pumps at no cost to the Regional Center of Children Oncology and Hematology in Cherkasy, as also stated in the Commercial Offer from Providian Medical accompanying this application.

A further and significant advantage of Braun infusion pumps in Ukraine, in comparison with pumps from other manufacturers, is the availability of a wide variety of consumable supplies in sufficient quantities in Braun's warehouses in the Ukraine, i.e., PVC systems, polyurethane systems, light protected systems, which are necessary for work with chemotherapeutic and cytostatic medications. Braun has an established history in Ukraine for a long time, and throughout this time, Braun has assured the availability of the necessary consumable supplies. It should be noted that Braun is the only supplier in Ukraine, which has consumable supplies made of various materials that satisfy the entire spectrum of end user needs.

Lastly, pumps manufactured by Braun are listed in protocols for clinical trials of up-to-date medications. It is of great importance, that Braun pumps contain a set of functions aimed at minimizing medical staff errors: a list of medications, dose calculation, various forms of medication administration (trapezoidal, multidose, programmed, etc.) which are critical for the infusion of chemotherapeutic medications at the precise dosages required.

Providian Medical is the distributor of Braun equipment in the Ukraine, so bids were solicited from Providian Medical for the equipment required to implement the present project from several equipment manufacturers. Labline LLC is the authorized representative of another German company, Fresenius Kabi, a supplier of certain supplies required for the successful implementation of this project, and attached is the bid solicited from Labline LLC for the necessary supplies.

Upon cancellation, TRF shall be entitled to a refund of any global grant funds, including any interest earned, that have not been expended.
- 7. The laws of the State of Illinois, USA, without reference to its conflicts of laws principles, shall govern all matters arising out of or relating to this Agreement, including, without limitation, its interpretation, construction, performance, and enforcement.
- 8. Any legal action brought by either party against the other party arising out of or relating to this Agreement must be brought in either, the Circuit Court of Cook County, State of Illinois, USA or the Federal District Court for the Northern District of Illinois, USA. Each party consents to the exclusive jurisdiction of these courts, and their respective appellate courts for the purpose of such actions. Nothing herein prohibits a party that obtains a judgment in either of the designated courts from enforcing the judgment in any other court. Notwithstanding the foregoing, TRF may also bring legal action against Sponsors and/or individuals traveling on grant funds in any court with jurisdiction over them.
- 9. This Agreement binds and benefits the parties and their respective administrators, legal representatives, and permitted successors and assigns.
- 10.If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be illegal, invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.
- 11. Sponsors may not assign any of its rights under this Agreement except with the prior written consent of TRF. Sponsors may not delegate any performance under this Agreement without the prior written consent of TRF. Any purported assignment of a Sponsor's rights or delegation of performance without TRF's prior written consent is void.
- 12.TRF may assign some or all of its rights under this Agreement to an associate foundation of TRF. TRF may delegate any performance under this Agreement to an associate foundation. Any other purported assignment of TRF's rights or delegation of performance without the Sponsors' prior written consent is void.
- 13. Sponsors will comply with all economic and trade sanctions, including those implemented by the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) of the United States Department of Treasury, and will ensure that they do not support or promote violence, terrorist activity or related training, or money laundering.
- 14. This Agreement constitutes the final agreement between the parties. No amendment or waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall be effective unless it is in the form of a writing signed by the parties.
- 15. Rotary International (RI) and TRF may use information contained in this application and subsequent reports to promote the activities by various means such as The Rotarian, Rotary Leader, rotary.org, etc. Unless indicated otherwise in writing, by submission of the photos, the parties hereby grant to RI and TRF the worldwide right to publish and use the photos, including but not limited to, in RI and TRF publications, advertisements, and Web sites and on social media channels and to license use to others, including, but not limited to, media outlets and its partners and through RI's online image database, for the purposes of promoting Rotary. By submitting the photos, the parties represent and warrant that all persons appearing in the photos have given their unrestricted written consent to use their likenesses and to license use to third parties.

- 16. The Sponsors agree to share information on best practices when asked, and TRF may provide their contact information to other Rotarians who may wish advice on implementing similar activities.
- 17. The Sponsors will ensure that all individuals traveling on grant funds have been informed of the travel policies stated in the Terms and Conditions and have been made aware that they are responsible for obtaining travel insurance.
